
QuickTime™ and a TIFF (Uncompressed) decompressor are needed to see this picture.

Government policies



- A report in 1999 stated that the Government wants to halve the numbers of teenage pregnancies by 2010.
- In 2004 the rates went down slightly but in London, they went up.

Government recommendations

- We don't want our taxes to go on young people having babies


